

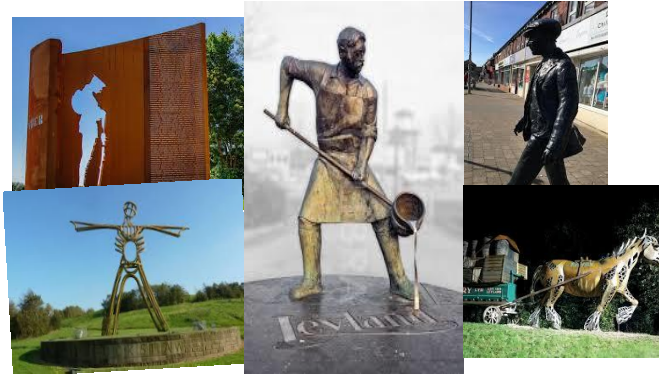
## Year 6 Summer 2 Topic Homework

**WHY NOT TRY....**

- Making buildings, giant food, robots or people, using modelling materials?
- Making a structure entirely made from tubes?
- Looking at structures found in playgrounds. Use these as ideas to build your own structure using straws/sticks.
- Building structures with off-cuts of wood, which are of different sizes and have different textures.
- Making a large scale sculpture with friends.
- Making special boxes, e.g. jewellery boxes. Use card

Play Dough Recipe:

**You Will Need:** • 200 grams plain flour • 100 grams salt • 150 ml of luke warm water

**Method:**

1. Put the flour, salt and any optional ingredients, such as food colouring or other colouring agents, for example coffee or turmeric, into a mixing bowl and gradually add the water. Mix to a soft dough.

(NB: The dough is not edible.)

2. Knead the wet dough on a work surface for 5-10 minutes to help create a smooth texture. Let the dough stand for about 15-20 minutes.

3. Divide your dough up if needed and start creating your sculptures!

4. Paint or varnish your sculpture, e.g. using nail varnish. Permanent markers work too but you must ask an adult for permission beforehand.
